MEETING MINUTES

<u>Call to Order</u> – The meeting was called to order by Committee Chair Elizabeth Flowers at 8:33a.m.

Roll Call

Committee Members Present: Matt Kellogg - yes, Lynn Cullick - here, Elizabeth Flowers - present, Matthew Prochaska - here. With four members present, a quorum was established to conduct committee business.

Member Purcell arrived at 8:36a.m.

<u>Approval of Agenda</u> – Motion made by Member Prochaska to approve the agenda, second by Member Cullick. <u>With all in agreement, the motion carried.</u>

<u>Approval of Minutes</u> – Member Prochaska made a motion to approve the June 28, 2017 meeting minutes, second by Member Kellogg. <u>With four in agreement, the motion carried</u>.

<u>Monthly Report</u> – Laura Pawson reviewed the census report with the committee. Written reports provided.

Weekly "Pet of the Week" ad in Shaw Media Newspapers Monthly adoption appearance on WSPY Television Operations Report – Ms. Pawson updated the committee on the potential of acquiring used radios from the Sheriff's Office for use. One radio would remain at the base office, and the warden or staff out in the field would have a radio, that would allow personnel to communicate with the main office when they arrive and depart calls. Ms. Pawson stated that there is a additional panic button on the radio that would channel to KenCom if utilized. Ms. Pawson hopes that there will be no cost for the used Sheriff's Office radios, but will keep the committee updated.

Accounting Report - Written report provided

Old Business

Update on the Fence Construction behind Trailer (South side) — Ms. Pawson reported the contractor has stated that the contractor plans to install the fence this month. Jim Smiley is still working with the City of Yorkville on requirements for installation.

New Business

- ➤ Approval of Amendment to Standard Operating Procedure for adopted dogs and cats to include a 72-hour return policy (Section 8, page 23) Ms. Pawson reported that she would like to implement a policy similar to what is being down in the City of Aurora. She is asking the committee to change the policy to include a 72-hour return policy. The committee recommended stating the timeframe as 3 business days for clarity. Member Kellogg made a motion to forward the item to the County Board for approval, second by Member Prochaska. With all members voting aye, the motion passed.
- ➤ Animal Control Mobile Office Sale Agreement Scott Koeppel informed the committee about the quote of sale agreement in the amount of \$9,800. Mr. Koeppel stated that the County can continue with a month-to-month lease, or proceed with the purchase. Mr. Koeppel stated that the agreement Discussion on potentially adding an additional restroom in the Animal Control facility. Member Kellogg made a motion to forward the item to the County Board for approval, second by Member Purcell. With five members voting aye, the motion passed.
- Discussion on the need for the Animal Control Committee to continue to meet monthly—Dr. Schlapp stated that from his perspective, the monthly bite reports, strays and the overall daily operation do not constitute the need for monthly meetings. Dr. Schlapp felt that emergency meetings or a meeting every three months would be sufficient for operation. Member Kellogg suggested receiving monthly financial and operational reports by email each month. Scott Koeppel stated that any emergency issues could be added to the COW meeting agenda, or to the County Board agenda. Mr. Koeppel also stated that more information and reports could be added to the Animal Control webpage on a monthly basis. Dr. Schlapp stated that Animal Control personnel were always welcome to consult with him about any issues that may arise between meetings. Member Purcell suggested cancelling the August meeting, and resuming again in September.

 There was consensus by the committee to cancel the August 23, 2017 meeting.

Good things come in 3's Meet Charlie the Tripod Dog

Have you ever met a tripod dog? If you have, you may have been surprised by how little having an amputation affects a dog's ability to get around. At some point in a pet's life it may be medically necessary to remove a leg as was the case with "Charlie" a sweet natured 2 year old Labrador/Boxer mix. Charlie came to our shelter when he was owner relinquished because his owner was moving and could no longer keep Charlie. The owner had let us know that Charlie had sustained a break to his back left leg. The break had already healed but Charlie walked with a noticeable limp. We also noticed that Charlie did not want to place much weight on his left leg, favoring the other 3. We took him to the vet where he had x-rays taken and the results were not good. Unfortunately the break had not healed correctly. This rendered Charlie's leg almost useless and possibly painful. The vet said that the best thing for Charlie was to remove the leg. The vet felt that Charlie should be able to recover quickly and be offered for adoption causing really no set-

backs for him at all. On September 10th Charlie received the surgery he needed thanks to donated funds from our "Medical Donation Fund". Amazingly Charlie did not need much of an adjustment period in order to regain almost complete mobility. Many pets require a little extra time to learn to balance after an amputation. In Charlie's case, he had already adapted since he had been used to placing more weight on 3 legs for quite some time. In fact. Charlie seems happier and more energetic than ever ' before. He may have lost a leg, but he gained a whole new sense of freedom . He is more bright, active and most importantly free of discomfort. Plus, he is as handsome as ever. We just think he is beautiful inside and out. Charlie has a bright future ahead, living a long healthy life playing ball and going for nice long walks. He is good boy and it's our hope he will be adopted soon. He will be a wonderful addition to any family. Good things come in 3's and that's our Charlie.

Charlie came from a home with children and is vaccinated, HW tested, mircrochipped and neutered.

Rescue Tails

On August 14th a beautiful senior yellow Labrador Retriever named "Chloe" was owner relinquished due to no fault of her own. Her owners had moved and were no longer able to keep Chloe. Sadly at 10 years old we knew Chloe may have a hard time adjusting in a kennel environment. We also know from experience the fact that senior pets can be difficult to place because many people want to adopt younger dogs. Chloe however showed us right away that she had so much to offer with an amazing personality so we wanted to do everything in our power to help get her in to a home. Chloe was overdue for her vaccinations and exam so the first thing we did was to take her to the vet. It is very important for pets especially senior pets to have regular annual examinations. Unfortunately a vet exam revealed some health concerns such as fatty tumors and a large mass on her side. She also had

an ear infection in both ears so we began treatment to get her feeling better. We began reaching out to home based rescue organizations right away with the hope a foster would open their heart and home to Chloe. Surprisingly, it didn't take very long to get a response from a rescue and we were so grateful. "Young at Heart Rescue" contacted us and informed us that they had a foster who would take Chloe in and care for her until they found a forever home for her. On August 14th Chloe was picked up by the rescue and transported to her new foster home. Fortunately for Chloe she did not have to spend very much time at the shelter and was able to be placed in a home quickly where she would be much more comfortable. Kendall County Animal Control is the County agency responsible for the enforcement of the state statutes governing rabies control in domestic companion animals. The State of Illinois requires that all dogs be vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian. Compliance with this law is monitored through the issuance of rabies tags for all dogs residing in the County. All dogs are required to wear their rabies tags when off of the owner's property. If a pet is lost, rabies tags also provide an excellent means of identifying your pet.

Kendall County Animal Control enforces the County's ordinance that prohibits dogs from running at large in unincorporated, residential areas. Animal Control also reports animal bites as well as pick up stray dogs that are in a contained area. Stray dogs may also be brought to the facility during business hours. Dogs and cats are available for adoption at our facility.

August Summary

KENDALL COUNTY ANIMAL CONTROL
DOG AT LARGE ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the residents of the County of Kendall that provisions be made for the care, protection, and control of animals in the County of Kendall.

WHEREAS, pursuant to 510 ILCS 5/9 st seq. the Illinois Animal Control Act, the County of Kendali is authorized to regulate Dogs running at large.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the County of Kendali, acting by the Kendali County Board, as follows.

Section 1: Dogs running at large; apprehension

- (a) Any dog in the county found running at large contrary to the provisions of the Animal Control act may be apprehended. For this purpose, the administrator shall use any existing or available pound, per 510 ILCS 5/9.
- (b) A person commits a violation of this section when he owns, possesses or harbors a dog which is at large. For the purposes of this paragraph, a dog is at large when it is off its custodian's premises and not under his/her control. A dog that is actively engaged in a legal hunting activity, including training, is not considered running at large if the dog is on land that is open to hunting or on land on which the person has obtained permission to hunt or to train a dog. A dog that is in a dog-friendly area or dog park is not considered to be running at large if the dog is monitored or supervised by a person.

Section 2: Impoundment: redemption

- (a) When an animal has been apprehended or impounded, the administrator shall cause notice of this event to be given to the owner of the animal, if that person is known. Such notice of this event to be given to the owner of the animal, if that person is known. Such notice may be given by telephone, by personal service or by mail to the last known address of the owner. The notice shall advise the owner that redemption of the animal must occur no later than seven business days from the date of notice of impoundment of the animal.
- (b) If the owner of any animal, which was impounded pursuant to this section desires to redeem the animal, redemption may be completed by doing all of the following:
 - (1) Paying all applicable fees including reclaim fee, board fees, deposits, rabies tag fees and any fees for treatment of injuries or illness to the animal. If a dog or cat does not have a readable microchip it shall be microchipped.
 - (2) Providing satisfactory proof to the administrator that the animal has been inoculated against rables and purchased a rables inoculation tag if applicable. If either inoculation or tag purchase has not been accomplished at such time, a deposit must be paid in addition to the reclaim fees if applicable.
 - (3) Proof of ownership and a driver's license or state I.D.

- (c) Prior to the fulfillment of the seven-day holding period, at the discretion of the administrator or his/her authorized agent, animals severely injured or ill may be humanely dispatched.
- (d) Animals not redeemed by the owner in accordance with the provisions of this article shall be offered for adoption, made available to a licensed humane society or rescue group or humanely euthanized as defined under the Animal Control Act.

Section 3: Any person violating any provision of this ordinance may be fined no less than \$75.00 no more than \$150.00 for each violation or offense.

Section 4: Severability

The invalidity of any section or part of this ordinance or any rule or regulation promulgated hereunder shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this ordinance.

Section 5: Prior Ordinances

Any prior Ordinance or Resolution regarding Animal Control dog at large is hereby repealed to the extent that it conflicts with this ordinance.

ORDINANCE 68-1

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE RUNNING AT LARGE OF DOGS IN UNINCORPORATED AREAS SUBDIVIDED FOR RESIDENCE PURPOSES

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Kendall that:

Section One: Any person who resides in an unincorporated area of the County of Kendall, which has been subdivided for residence purposes, and who chooses to own or possess a dog, shall at all times keep any such dog, owned or possessed by any such person, securely tied, or securely enclosed on the property occupied by the owner or possessor of any such dog.

Section Two: Any such person described in Section One hereof shall not permit or allow any dog, owned or possessed by any such person to run at large upon the public streets or highways, or upon the properties of other persons in the unincorporated areas of the County of Kendall which have been subdivided for residence purposes.

Section Three: Failure of any person described in Section One hereof to comply with any provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed a violation of this Ordinance and any such person shall be subject to the fine hereinafter provided.

Section Four: Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not less than Ten Dollars (\$10.00) nor more than Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) for each violation or offense.

Section Five: This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication in accordance with law.

ARTICLE II. - DOGS

Sec. 10-24 19. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

"Administrator" means a veterinarian licensed by the state and appointed pursuant to the Illinois Animal Control Act, or in the event a veterinarian cannot be found and appointed pursuant to the Act, a non-veterinarian may serve as administrator under this Act. In the event the administrator is not a veterinarian, the administrator shall defer to the veterinarian regarding all medical decisions.

Animal control act means the Illinois Animal Control Act (510 ILCS 5/1 et seq.).

Animal control warden means any person appointed by the administrator to perform duties as assigned by the administrator to effectuate this article.

"Continuous" means that the noise continues with no interruptions or only unreasonably brief interruptions:

Dog means all members of the family Canidae.

Kennel shall mean any lot or premises, or portion thereof, whether public or private, on which more than five dogs, five cats, or five other household domestic animals over six months of age are kept or on which more than two such animals are maintained, boarded, bred, or cared for in return for remunerations or are kept for the purpose of sale.

Leash means a cord, rope, strap or chain which shall be securely fastened to the collar or harness of a dog and shall be of sufficient strength to keep the dog under control.

Nuisance Dog means a dog which growls, snaps at, runs after, or chases any person or persons not on the premises of the owner or keeper. A dog that runs after or chases bicycles, motor vehicles, motorcycles, or other vehicles being driven, pulled, or pushed on the streets, highways or public ways. A dog which runs on a roadway causing a traffic hazard, or is involved in a traffic accident. A dog which digs, scratches, excretes, or causes waste/garbage to be scattered on properly other than its owner's. If whether alone or in a pack with other dogs, it threatens, bites, attacks, or prevs on human beings, game animals, domestic animals, or fowl.

Owner means any person having a right of property in an animal, or who keeps or harbors an animal, or who has it in his care, or acts as its custodian, or who knowingly permits a dog to remain on any premises occupied by him or her. "Owner" does not include a feral cat caretaker participating in a trap, spay/neuter, return or release program.

Person means any person, firm, corporation, partnership, society, association or other legal entity, any public or private institution, the state, municipal corporation or political subdivision of the state, or any other business unit.

Pound means any facility approved by the administrator for the purpose of enforcing this article and used as a shelter for seized, stray homeless, abandoned or unwanted dogs.

Stray dog means a dog not on the premises of the owner and not under the control of the owner by leash or other recognized control methods.

 - 3. A complaint made by one neighbor, but which is corroborated by a responding officer who observes at least 10 minutes of continuous howling, veloing, barking or otherwise.

Sec. 10-22, - Enforcement.

- (a) The administrator may appoint as many deputy administrators and animal control wardens to aid him in enforcing this article as the county board shall authorize.
- (b) Except for rables inoculation for dogs the compensation of the administrator, deputy administrator or animal control wardens shall be as fixed by the board of health.
- (c) The county board may utilize monies from the general fund to effectuate the provisions of this article.
- (d) The administrator, deputy administrator and animal control wardens in enforcing this article, are clothed with the police powers set forth in section 5 of the Illinois Animal Control Act (510 ILCS 5/5).

All Rabies Registration Ordinance Fines listed penalty fines shall be paid to the Animal Control Office.

If the above fine is paid to the Animal Control Office within 7 working days, excluding holidays, the fine shall be reduced to \$75.

Section 4: Severability

Sec. 10. Impoundment; redemption. When dogs or cats are apprehended and impounded, they must be scanned for the presence of a microchip and examined for other currently acceptable methods of identification, including, but not limited to, identification tags, tattoos, and rabies license tags. The examination for identification shall be done within 24 hours after the intake of each dog or cat. The Administrator shall make every reasonable attempt to contact the owner as defined by Section 2.16, agent, or caretaker as soon as possible. The Administrator shall give notice of not less than 7 business days to the owner, agent, or caretaker prior to disposal of the animal. Such notice shall be mailed to the last known address of the owner, agent, or caretaker. Testimony of the Administrator, or his or her authorized agent, who mails such notice shall be evidence of the receipt of such notice by the owner, agent, or caretaker of the animal. A mailed notice shall remain the primary means of owner, agent, or caretaker contact; however, the Administrator shall also attempt to contact the owner, agent, or caretaker by any other contact information, such as by telephone or email address, provided by the microchip or other method of identification found on the dog or cat. If the dog or cat has been microchipped and the primary contact listed by the chip manufacturer cannot be located or refuses to reclaim the dog or cat, an attempt shall be made to contact any secondary contacts listed by the chip manufacturer prior to adoption, transfer, or euthanization. Prior to transferring the dog or cat to another humane shelter, rescue group, or euthanization, the dog or cat shall be scanned again for the presence of a microchip and examined for other means of identification. If a second scan provides the same identifying information as the initial intake scan and the owner, agent, or caretaker has not been located or refuses to reclaim the dog or cat, the animal control facility may proceed with the adoption, transfer, or euthanization.

In case the owner, agent, or caretaker of any impounded dog or cat desires to make redemption thereof, he or she may do so by doing the following:

- a. Presenting proof of current rables inoculation and registration, if applicable.
- b. Paying for the rabies inoculation of the dog or cat and registration, if applicable.
- c. Paying the pound for the board of the dog or cat for the period it was impounded.
- d. Paying into the Animal Control Fund an additional impoundment fee as prescribed by the Board as a penalty for the first offense and for each subsequent offense.
- e. Paying a \$25 public safety fine to be deposited into the Pet Population Control Fund; the fine shall be waived if it is the dog's or cat's first impoundment and the owner, agent, or caretaker has the animal spayed or neutered within 14 days.
- f. Paying for microchipping and registration if not already done.

The payments required for redemption under this Section shall be in addition to any other penalties invoked under this

State

(510 ILCS 5/9) (from Ch. 8, par. 359)

Sec. 9. Any dog found running at large contrary to provisions of this Act may be apprehended and impounded. For this purpose, the Administrator shall utilize any existing or available animal control facility or licensed animal shelter. The dog's owner shall pay a \$25 public safety fine, \$20 of which shall be deposited into the Pet Population Control Fund and \$5 of which shall be retained by the county or municipality. A dog found running at large contrary to the provisions of this Act a second or subsequent time must be spayed or neutered within 30 days after being reclaimed unless already spayed or neutered; failure to comply shall result in impoundment.

A dog that is actively engaged in a legal hunting activity, including training, is not considered to be running at large if the dog is on land that is open to hunting or on land on which the person has obtained permission to hunt or to train a dog. A dog that is in a dog-friendly area or dog park is not considered to be running at large if the dog is monitored or supervised by a person.

Sec. 11. When not redeemed by the owner, agent, or caretaker, a dog or cat must be scanned for a microchip. If a microchip is present, the registered owner must be notified. After contact has been made or attempted, dogs or cats deemed adoptable by the animal control facility shall be offered for adoption, or made available to a licensed humane society or rescue group. If no placement is available, it shall be humanely dispatched pursuant to the Humane Euthanasia in Animal Shelters Act. An animal pound or animal shelter shall not adopt or release any dog or cat to anyone other than the owner unless the animal has been rendered incapable of reproduction and microchipped, or the person wishing to adopt an animal prior to the surgical procedures having been performed shall have executed a written agreement promising to have such service performed, including microchipping, within a specified period of time not to exceed 30 days. Failure to fulfill the terms of the agreement shall result in seizure and impoundment of the animal and any offspring by the animal pound or shelter, and any monies which have been deposited shall be forfeited and submitted to the Pet Population Control Fund on a yearly basis. This Act shall not prevent humane societies from engaging in activities set forth by their charters; provided, they are not inconsistent with provisions of this Act and other existing laws. No animal shelter or animal control facility shall release dogs or cats to an individual representing a rescue group, unless the group has been licensed or has a foster care permit issued by the Illinois Department of Agriculture or is a representative of a not-for-profit out-of-state organization. The Department may suspend or revoke the license of any animal shelter or animal control facility that fails to comply with the requirements set forth in this Section or that fails to report its intake and euthanasia statistics each year

Dear Mr. Koeppel:

I am requesting a refund of the \$120 I paid to Kendall County Animal Shelter on 8/2/2017.

Early this month my husband and I adopted an American Staffordshire Terrier named Smitty. Although the dog was a pit bull we were told that he had no past record of aggression and he was very "sweet". After spending time with Smitty, we paid the fee and happily took him home. The shelter gave us a voucher to take Smitty to a vet within 72 hours for a complimentary cursory exam. We made an appointment with Countryside Vet in Yorkville where he had received veterinary services through the shelter.

The vet was unable to service Smitty. The dog became a different and scary animal while there. That's when the vet told us that Smitty had shown extreme aggression while he was there earlier. Their records indicated that he must be muzzled when examined. The vet retrieved a muzzle but the dog wouldn't allow the muzzle to be placed on him. We suggested the vet leave the room and my husband attempted to calm the dog down and muzzle him. But unfortunately that was not to happen.

At that time, many alarms rang in our heads. Although we've had dogs that disliked visits to the vets for various reasons, we've never had a dog that had to be muzzled. Furthermore, we couldn't muzzle him if we wished to do so. And every time we took the dog to the vet in the future we would have this problem. Adding to this concern was the fact that the dog had met only a handful of our friends and relatives. It was possible that someone he was yet to meet might trigger this same type of aggressive behavior. We have children and grandchildren regularly visit us. My mind raced and I realized that perhaps even a stranger we might encounter while out on a walk could provoke him.

Reluctantly we realized that we could not keep Smitty. In just 1½ days we had grown pretty fond of him. Although we already had a cage, we bought him a better and newer one. We admired his Intelligence. We gave him toys. We took his picture and posted it on Facebook. We even let Smitty sleep in our bed with usl You get the idea. The "beloved pet syndrome" had kicked in.

Taking Smitty back to the shelter was very difficult for us. I was truly tearful. But it had to be done. We would not be liable for a possible dog attack on someone in the future.

While at the vet, we had been allowed to view the vet's record on Smitty. Although I don't have a copy of the record and cannot remember precisely all that was written, I clearly recall three words: "Risky for Adoption".

I understand that the shelter wishes that their animals will be placed in loving homes. I understand that they might not wish to share the fact that the vet appraised the dog as "risky for adoption". I applaud the staff we encountered at the shelter. They were pleasant and very good to the animals they lovingly tend. However, I believe they were obligated to at least mention that the dog showed such aggressive behavior, even if only at certain times or under certain circumstances. Such a fact is critical when deciding whether or not an animal will "fit" into a family.

Mr. Koeppel, as you told me, the county's regulations do not allow for a refund when an animal is returned to the shelter. We were prepared to uphold our end of the deal. We wanted to keep the dog. But the shelter failed to provide disclosure on what I consider to be an essential point. As you noted, we have received a voucher for another pet which is good through 10/3/2017. I appreciate it and we will check with the shelter for other pet "candidates". However, the choices there are not very numerous and frankly there are many options available through other shelters and rescue groups. The voucher is not transferrable to outside organizations.

My name is Stephanie and I am currently a foster parent for It's A Pittie Rescue (IPR). I am also a certified dog trainer. On August 19th, I picked up my foster dog Smitty. Smitty is an approx 1.5 year old, neutered, male Pit Bull, whom was in your shelter for a few months. I agreed to foster Smitty sight unseen with only seeing a couple of videos of him interacting with other dogs.

Smitty was picked up from the shelter by one of IPR's volunteers, Cheryl, who then met me at IPR's vet. Upon meeting Smitty, he was a very friendly guy. He was a bit cautious, which is very typical for any shelter dog, but he handled things well. He seemed interested in his new surroundings, taking in each new adventure with ease.
